

Two Museum Days in Washington, DC: Smithsonian That Are Actually Open

A tightly planned, closure-checked weekend for two, arriving by Amtrak from Philadelphia, September 12 to 13, 2026. Every museum below was verified against its official Smithsonian page as open for your dates, and we call out exactly which halls are still behind construction walls so you never walk into a plywood dead end.

Verified closure status for your dates (the headline answer to your special request):

- The National Air and Space Museum on the Mall is open daily 10:00 am to 5:30 pm, free admission. Its restored galleries reopened in phases, and the previously announced schedule of all seven remaining galleries opening July 1 was adjusted due to the impacts of the government shutdown in fall 2025, so five galleries opened July 1 and the remaining two galleries open this fall. Specifically, At Home in Space opens October 30 and Modern Military Aviation opens November 11. The museum itself confirms that two more exhibits will open this fall, and while they work, part of the Museum is closed. Translation: on your September 13 visit the great majority of the building is open (Wright Flyer, Apollo 11 Columbia, Milestones of Flight, Pioneers of Flight, WWII in the Air, How Things Fly, Living in the Space Age, the planetarium and IMAX), but the two galleries above will still be closed. We plan around them, so no wasted walk.
- Natural History: Free admission, no passes required, open 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
- American History: open every day, except December 25, from 10:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., admission is free. Note two kids' spaces have limited days, which does not affect you: Wegmans Wonderplace is open Wednesday to Sunday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., closed Monday to Tuesday; Draper Spark!Lab is open Wednesday to Sunday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., closed Monday to Tuesday.
- NMAAHC: open, but all visitors, regardless of age, must have a timed-entry pass to enter the museum.

1b) Recommendation and Best Alternative

Our recommendation. Do the two "no-pass, walk-right-in" giants on Saturday afternoon after your train (Natural History and American History, both free and both open with no timed entry), then reserve Air and Space for Sunday morning with a timed pass. This front-loads the museums that never sell out and protects your one pass-dependent museum for when you are rested and can grab an early slot. Reasons: both Saturday museums are literally next door to each other on the Mall, both confirmed open 10 to 5:30 with no ticket friction, and it leaves Saturday's golden hour free for monuments at dusk.

Best alternative. If your teenager-at-heart wants maximum wow, swap American History for the **National Museum of African American History and Culture** on Sunday as your third museum. It is superb, but it is the one that adds pass complexity: its highest visitation is 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Friday through Sunday, and during that window there may be long lines to access the History Galleries. Since your Sunday is a getaway day, only add it if you can secure an early pass (see below).

For any hotel booking, note honestly: You will see the binding price for your exact dates and occupancy at the provider's booking step, it changes daily.

Timed pass mechanics for Air and Space: Free timed-entry passes are required for all visitors, regardless of age. The good news for a relaxed morning: passes do not limit the amount of time you can spend in the Museum. Reserve online in advance; a limited number of same-day passes are also released.

Timed pass mechanics for NMAAHC: a limited number of timed-entry passes are available; advance timed-entry passes are released 30 days in advance on a rolling basis, and same-day timed-entry passes are released online only by 8:15 a.m. EST daily. Individuals can reserve up to nine free timed-entry passes for their visit. Book the earliest Sunday slot you can to dodge the midday crowd.

2) Day-by-Day Plan

Saturday, September 12, 2026: Arrive, two open museums, monuments at dusk

Morning: Amtrak from Philadelphia. Take a mid-morning Northeast Regional from Philadelphia 30th Street Station to Washington Union Station. Amtrak Northeast Regional offers frequent daily trips from Philadelphia to Washington, with an average travel time of 2 hours. Fare anchor: tickets on the Northeast Regional average around \$69 one way (guide value, cheaper with advance Saver fares). From Union Station it is a short Metro ride or taxi to your Penn Quarter hotel to drop bags.

💡 Tip: Book the Northeast Regional, not Acela, for this route. The time saved by Acela is minor here and the price jump is not worth it for two adults on a budget. Reserve a Saver fare online weeks ahead for the lowest number.

Early afternoon: National Museum of Natural History. Free, no pass, open 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., no passes required. Hit the greatest hits: the 45.5-carat Hope Diamond, Ocean Hall, Mammals Hall, Hall of Human Origins, Insect Zoo, dinosaurs, and the African bush elephant in the rotunda. Entrance at 10th St. & Constitution Ave. NW. Map: [Open in maps](#)

💡 Tip: When you arrive you can expect a full security screening similar to what you might experience at the airport, except you can keep your shoes and belts on. Arriving a few minutes before opening or after 2 p.m. trims the line.

Late afternoon: National Museum of American History (a two-minute walk west). Free, no pass, open 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Do not miss the Star-Spangled Banner, Dorothy's ruby slippers, and the 250th-anniversary blockbuster: in 2026 the museum is hosting a building-wide exhibition, In Pursuit of Life, Liberty & Happiness, showcasing 250 objects ranging from the 1700s to the present day. Entrance on Constitution Ave (first floor) or Madison Drive on the Mall (second floor). Map: [Open in maps](#)

💡 Tip: With two big museums in one afternoon, pick 3 to 4 target exhibits in each rather than trying to see everything. Museum fatigue is real; curation beats completeness.

Quick lunch (grab-and-go between train and museums): the cafeterias inside both museums are convenient but pricey; a faster, cheaper option is a counter-service spot in Penn Quarter before you head to the Mall. Budget about \$12 to \$18 per person plus tax.

Dusk: Monuments walk. Head to the west end of the Mall for golden hour. Walk the Washington Monument grounds, the WWII Memorial, and finish at the Lincoln Memorial as the sky goes pink and the monuments light up. All are free and open 24 hours. Map: [Open in maps](#)

💡 Tip: In mid-September, sunset in DC is around 7:15 to 7:25 p.m. Aim to be at the Lincoln Memorial about 30 to 45 minutes before sunset, then walk back east toward dinner as the monuments glow.

☁ Plan B (weather-dependent): If it is raining at dusk, swap the outdoor walk for the indoor, glassed-in overlooks and skip the long Mall stroll; do a compressed monuments-by-taxi loop the next morning, or simply enjoy the illuminated Capitol dome view from a covered spot near your hotel. The monuments are just as striking lit up on a clear night, so a dry evening is worth waiting for.

Dinner: Rasika (Penn Quarter), modern Indian, your one nice dinner. Address: 633 D St NW, Washington, DC 20004. Phone: (202) 637-1222. Saturday hours are 4:30 pm to 10:30 pm. It is a special-occasion favorite, so reserve ahead. Map: [Open in maps](#)

💡 Tip: Order the crispy spinach chaat and plenty of naan, and note that US menu prices exclude tax; plan on 18 to 20 percent tip on the pre-tax total for good table service.

Alternative nice dinners in the same area if Rasika is booked: **Oyamel** (upscale Mexican, Penn Quarter) and **Jaleo** (Spanish tapas, Penn Quarter), both well regarded and walkable. Check current hours before you go.

Sunday, September 13, 2026: Air and Space (and an optional third), then home

Morning: National Air and Space Museum. This is your timed-pass museum. Open daily 10:00 am to 5:30 pm, admission always free. Location: 650 Jefferson Drive SW, Washington, DC 20560; visitors must enter through the doors on Jefferson Drive. Map: [Open in maps](#)

What is open and worth your time on September 13: Boeing Milestones of Flight Hall, Barron Hilton Pioneers of Flight, World War I: The Birth of Military Aviation, RTX Living in the Space Age Hall, TEXTRON How Things Fly, plus star objects including the 1903 Wright Flyer, the Apollo 11 Command Module Columbia, and Mercury Friendship 7. For the young-at-heart wanting hands-on action: in TEXTRON How Things Fly, 45+ different interactives help kids of all ages understand the science of flight.

What is still closed (so you don't hunt for it): At Home in Space and Modern Military Aviation, which reopen in fall (October 30 and November 11 respectively), and the eastern portion of the building still under construction.

💡 Tip: Reserve the first Sunday slot you can and go straight to the Milestones of Flight Hall before it fills. Then consider the Planetarium or a daytime IMAX documentary as a sit-down break; both are inside the building.

☁ Plan B: Air and Space is fully indoor, so rain is a non-issue here; if anything, a wet Sunday makes it the perfect place to spend the whole morning.

Optional third museum (only with a pass): NMAAHC. If you booked an early pass, this is a powerful finish. Realistic time budget: touring the History Galleries in their entirety will take approximately 2 hours and will require about 1 mile of walking, and last entry for all visitors is 4:00 p.m. Given your early-afternoon train home, an early morning NMAAHC slot is the only way to fit it comfortably. Map: [Open in maps](#)

💡 Tip: If you cannot get an early pass, skip it guilt-free and give Air and Space the full morning. Two great museums done well beats three done in a rush.

Quick lunch near the Mall, then Metro or taxi to Union Station for your Northeast Regional home to Philadelphia. Budget about \$12 to \$18 per person plus tax.

💡 Tip: Book your return train for early-to-mid afternoon so a slightly longer museum morning does not turn into a station sprint. Arrive at Union Station about 20 to 30 minutes before departure.

3) Practical Notes and Checklist

Getting around: The Mall museums and Penn Quarter are walkable; Metro fills the gaps. For Natural History, take the Silver, Orange or Blue lines to the Smithsonian station and use the Mall exit; the Green and Yellow lines also work via the Archives-Navy Memorial-Penn Quarter stop.

Security: Every Smithsonian has airport-style screening. Travel light, no oversized bags.

Passes recap: Air and Space requires a free timed pass for everyone. NMAAHC requires a free timed pass. Natural History and American History require nothing; walk in.

- ☐ Comfortable walking shoes and a light rain layer for September
- ☐ Refillable water bottle (museums have fountains)

Budget honesty: \$700 total is realistic if you land an advance Amtrak Saver fare and a mid-priced hotel, and keep lunches to counter service. If you book train and hotel late, or choose a boutique/luxury property, you can blow past \$700 on lodging and transport alone. The single biggest lever is booking the train and hotel early. The museums themselves cost nothing, which is what makes DC forgiving on a budget.

Named hotel options (guide-value anchors, Penn Quarter / near the Mall):

- Hotel Harrington** (budget, best-located). Located an 11-minute walk from the National Mall, Hotel Harrington offers 3-star accommodations and features a bar. For no-frills budget properties like this, rates can range roughly \$120 to \$200 per night, especially off-peak or booked well in advance (guide value, as of June 2026; confirm exact date). Link: hotel-harrington.com

- **Motto by Hilton Washington DC City Center** (mid-range, lively). Mid-range options such as Motto by Hilton or a Courtyard by Marriott typically fall into the \$200 to \$350 per night range (guide value, as of June 2026). Link: hilton.com
- **Kimpton Hotel Monaco Washington DC** (upscale splurge). High-end properties like the Kimpton Hotel Monaco generally start from \$350 and can go upwards of \$600+ per night, particularly in peak season (guide value; likely pushes you over budget). Link: monaco-dc.com

For all three: You will see the binding price for your exact dates and occupancy at the provider's booking step, it changes daily.
